Food additives are substances added to food products during production to enhance the flavor, texture, appearance, or shelf-life of General provisions and Staple foods.

- They can be natural or synthetic and are used in varying amounts depending on the type of specific product being made and the desired effect. Food additives used in General provisions and Staple foods include preservatives, antioxidants, emulsifiers, stabilizers, thickeners, flavor enhancers, and colorants.
- Food safety authorities regulate food additives to ensure that they are safe for consumption and do not pose a health risk to consumers. Depending on their potential health risks, some additives may be restricted or banned in certain countries.
